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Emily is an Assistant State Prosecuting Attorney in Austin. Originally from North Texas, Emily got her English degree from Rice, traveled to China to teach English for a year, and returned to Austin for law school. Wendell started his own practice in 1981. His representation has included the defense of major national corporations, high-profile cases involving bank fraud, tax evasion and white-collar crimes, and offenses ranging from DWI to Capital Murder. He has been president of the Harris County Criminal Lawyers Association, chair of the State Bar of Texas Committee on Pattern Criminal Jury Charges, and co-editor of the Houston Bar Journal. He currently serves on the Pattern Jury Charge Committee and the Committee that approves and oversees the appointment of attorneys in the Southern District. He has lectured on criminal topics at various universities and appeared on national and local television and radio shows, discussing high-profile criminal cases.
