#### **One night stand**

#### **Inmates housed together**

### TPC §22.01(a)(1) Assault bodily injury family violence

- On or about a certain date
- In your County, Texas
- Defendant
- Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes bodily injury to another
- And the victim was a member of the family or household of the suspect
- Class A Misdemeanor

### TPC §22.01(b)(2) (A)(i) and (ii) Assault bodily injury FV- Enhanced

- On or about a certain date
- In your County, Texas
- Defendant
- Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes bodily injury to another
- And the victim was a member of the family or household of the suspect
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Degree Felony

- Abandon/Endanger Child
- • Agg. Assault
- • Agg. Kidnapping
- • Agg. Sexual Assault
- Aiding Suicide
- Assault Bodily Injury
- •Assault by Offensive Contact
- Assault by Threat
- Capital Murder
- •Continuous Violence Against the Family (aka Assault Family
  - Violence 2+ w/in 12 Mos)

- Criminally Negligent Homicide
- Deadly Conduct
- •Indecency with a Child
- Indecent Assault
- Injury to Child, Disabled or Elderly
- • Kidnapping
- • Manslaughter
- •Murder
- •Sexual Assault

## PRIOR CONVICTION

 The prior conviction must also have been committed against a member of the defendant's family, a member of the defendant's household, or a person with whom the defendant has or has had a dating relationship.

**New Family** Violence Enhancement (HB 1589) Effective September 1<sup>,</sup> 2023

TPC §22.01(b)(2)(A)(ii)(b&c)

### ASSAULT FAMILY MEMBER

can now be enhanced to a **3<sup>rd</sup> degree felony** if the defendant has a <u>prior</u> <u>conviction</u> for *Violation of a Protective Order* or *Bond Condition* in a Family Violence case



## PRIOR CONVICTION

### TPC §22.01(b)(2)(B) Assault bodily injury FV- Impeding Breath

- In your county, Texas
- Defendant
- Intentionally, knowingly or recklessly
- Caused bodily injury
- By impeding breath or circulation of the blood
  - By applying pressure to the complainant's throat or neck, or
  - By blocking the complainant's nose or mouth
- Family member, household, or dating
- 3<sup>rd</sup> degree felony UNLESS prior conviction = 2<sup>nd</sup> degree felony

### TPC §22.01(b)(8) Assault on a Pregnant Person

- In Your County, Texas
- The defendant
- Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly
- Caused bodily injury to the complainant
- Who the defendant knew was pregnant at the time of the offense
- By manner and means

### Continuous violence against the family

- On or about a certain date
- In Your County, Texas
- The Defendant
- Intentionally, knowingly, and recklessly
- Cause bodily injury to another
- Household, Family, or Dating relationship
- The Defendant commits two assaults during a period that was 12 months or less in duration
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Degree Felony



# Can be two different victims

### Aggravated Assault- Deadly Weapon

- On or about a certain date
- In Fort Bend County, Texas
- A particular person
- Commits assault
  - (1) Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes bodily injury to another OR
  - (2) intentionally or knowingly threatens another with imminent bodily injury
- And the person uses or exhibits a deadly weapon during the commission of the assault
- 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree

### Aggravated Assault- Deadly Weapon – FV/SBI

- On or about a certain date
- In Fort Bend County, Texas
- A particular person
- Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly
- Causes **SERIOUS** bodily injury
- With a deadly weapon.
- Family/household member or dating relationship
- 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Felony
- Good/Just alternative to Murder

## Just because you can doesn't mean you should.

### Violation of Protective Order (or bond conditions in FV case) TPC §25.07/25.072

- In your county, Texas
- Defendant
- Intentionally or knowingly
- Did violate a protective order or bond condition in a family violence case by:
- Communicating a threat to complainant
- Communicating a threat through a 3<sup>rd</sup> party
- Going to a protected residence
- Going to a protected childcare facility
- Possessing a firearm

#### Violation of Protective Order (or bond conditions in FV case) TPC §25.07/25.072 •Elements:

- In your county, Texas
- Defendant
- Intentionally or knowingly
- Did violate a protective order or bond condition in family violence case by:
- Committing assault
- Committing sexual assault
- Committing an act in furtherance of stalking
- Any violation with 2 prior convictions of VPO
